



# Preliminary survey: Identifying institutions holding Japanese artworks




Before departure: Have executed the investigation and identified institutions that preserve Japanese artworks.



# Status using of ICCD catalogue cards of the collection





# Status of digitization of the collection






# State of permanent exhibition







