- **Dr. Garret MARTIN**

Title: *Challenging Cold War Orthodoxies - General de Gaulle's foreign policy in the 1960s*

The 1960s marked a period during which France actively tried to overcome the Cold War order and to create new European security architecture. The presentation will try to explain that development by emphasizing General de Gaulle's view of the Cold War, and how important international changes in the 1960s led him to believe that the bipolar conflict was fast becoming obsolete.

Dr. Garret MARTIN obtained his PhD from the London School of Economics and Political Science. His dissertation focused on General de Gaulle's foreign policy in the 1960s. He is also the co-editor of *Globalizing de Gaulle: International Perspectives on French Foreign Policies, 1958-1969*.

- **Dr. Louise WOODROOFE**

Title: *"Truth can be a far more potent weapon": FRUS and the Cold War.*

The Foreign Relations of the United States series, produced by the U.S. Department of State, has long served as the first window into the documentation of the Cold War. Yet, the Cold War has also influenced the production of the series and played a role in changing FRUS into a more complete record. From controversies stemming from publishing the records of the World War II era Yalta Conferences to debates about documenting covert actions, the FRUS series and Cold War scholarship have become inexorably intertwined.

Dr. Louise Woodroffe is a historian with the United States Department of State. She has a B.A. in History from Yale University and a PhD in International History from the London School of Economics and Political Science. She is the author of "Buried in the Sands of the Ogaden": the United States, the Horn of Africa and the Demise of Détente (Kent State University Press, forthcoming in 2013). Currently, she is working on the FRUS volume on Africa during the Carter Administration.

○ **Dr. Naoto TSUZAKI**

Title: *West Germany's Foreign Policies during the 1960s*

Compared to the years of the crises (1958-1962) and the detent era (1969-1975), it is difficult to definitely characterize the interval period between these two times (1962-1969). However, it was an important time for West Germany to rediscover its identity in the world. It is imperative to scrutinize this issue to fully understand West Germany's foreign policies in the later years.

Dr. Naoto TAUZAKI is Research Fellow (History of International Relations) in Graduate School of Law, Kyoto University. He obtained hid PhD from Kyoto University.

Title: *Japanese foreign policy and the Cold War in the 1960s*

Now studies of Japanese diplomatic history in the Cold War are making considerable progress because rich historical documents were made available to researchers through the change of government in 2009. By introducing these new studies, this presentation explores how Japan viewed the Cold War, and how the Cold War influenced Japanese foreign policy in the 1960s.

Dr. Tomoaki MURAKAMI is Post-doctoral Fellow in Ritsumeikan University. He obtained hid PhD from Kobe University. He studies Japanese foreign policy toward the United Nations during the Cold War.
