All facilities have a common space that students can read books freely and study, and a support desk that students can consult BBP advisors about foreign language study or study abroad. Currently, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, BBP is providing these services partly online. Events held by BBP student staff are also using online services like Zoom. In Kinugasa campus, BBP Project Team consisting of twenty-three student staff is planning various events for students. ## Dr. Sayaka Sakuma



## I How did you become in charge of BBP?

I have been studying abroad in Hawaii for about 7 years, this includes participating in an exchange program at university and going on to graduate school. At that time, I lived as a participant at the East-West Center, a research and educational institution in Hawaii that hosts researchers and students from more than 40 countries around the world, so international exchange is not only through regular events, but also through connections in daily life. I realized that it would provide an abundant opportunity for me to learn and grow.

At BBP, we create opportunities for people from various backgrounds to get to know and interact with one another in their university life. I was strongly attracted to this idea because I remembered my own study abroad experiences.

## Please give a message to your readers.

For those who are looking for information on studying abroad, interested in international exchanges, and Ritsumeikan University in overall, there are many things that can be acquired from BBP. Many friends you have not seen yet are active on this platform. Please join us on events and satisfy your curiosities. I am very much looking forward to seeing you!

### What kind of work do you do within BBP?

As an intercultural advisor, I provide consultations who are interested in international exchanges and study abroad. So far, I have had the opportunity to talk with students who have various hopes, such as "I have never been abroad but would like to study abroad at university" or "I want to study abroad from graduate school". We introduce study abroad programs and propose preparation processes that match your wishes as much as possible.

## Do you have college experience (Like BBP)?

When I studied abroad at the University of Hawaii at Manoa, I lived and worked at the East-West Center, an institution where graduate students and researchers studying Asia and the Pacific gather from all over the world. At the East-West Center, students play a central role like BBP, planning and managing various events such as research presentations, Concert on the Lawn (outdoor concert), and International Potluck Party. I was involved in event planning as a member of the club. Every time I see everyone working at BBP, I remember my life at that time and am always very excited.

## Please tell us tips on how to study a language, based on your own experiences!

It is hard to know which is the best way to study a language, and even if you progressively continue, you may feel uneasy at certain points. Especially in English, there are many kinds of teaching materials, and I was often confused just by choosing one book.

I have liked English since I was in junior high school, but I didn't know how to study, so I developed my own technique to study, which was to write out the lines while watching the Harry Potter DVD. It was an opportunity to learn expressions and spelling, but it did not last very long, so it probably did not fit for long-term study.

In my hometown of Okinawa, I can listen to the radio transmitted at the U.S. military base, so while I was attending college, I did shadowing (pronounced while imitating the English I hear) while playing news in the car. Also, try changing the display settings of your mobile phone or computer from Japanese to English. I still do not know the correct answer to how to study a language, but I think that every day, I am constantly looking for ways to enjoy studying by gradually incorporating what I can do into my daily life.

However, taking TOEFL preparation classes was the most helpful in preparing for my program. The TOEFL score was essential for both exchange study abroad programs and graduate school, so I continued to try to get used to the exam format. I was not confident until the end, but I managed to get a passing score. After that, I had a part-time job as a staff member of a language school, so I was very fortunate to have a teacher whom I met there. Also, an English teacher at the university helped me by correcting the essays necessary for the graduate school admission examination.

I feel that my language studies are still going on after studying abroad and will never end. However, there are still small steps to be taken, such as expressions that can be done without noticing it, and the ability to read treatises a little faster, so I would like to continue learning in my own way. I am open for any recommendations regarding language study that you thought to yourself, "this is good!".



### What are you looking forward to at BBP?

When I first met the BBP project members, I was overwhelmed by your energy. As we communicate mostly online due to the global pandemic, I still learn a lot from the creativity and suppleness of flexibly devising ways to connect with people. Seeing how BBPs from other campuses and other universities are participating in events, I feel that having a limited choice to host events online, will become the superpower of this semester's BBP project team members. I am really looking forward to experiencing the process of trial and errors, such as doing what we can and creating new ways, in the current situation where we often feel limited. And most important of all, I am really looking forward to talking with you and learning about what you are interested in and what kind of student life you are living in!
