How has disease control been implemented in the international arena, particularly for coping with fatal infectious diseases? These lectures examine the various facets of infectious disease and its place in international relations. Professor Harrison's lecture explores the narratives around the decline of the West during COVID and their place in international relations. Dr. Kim's lecture looks at the dark side of international relations, focusing on research connected to epidemic haemorrhagic fever and the use of data acquired by unethical means. The two invited lecturers from the University of Oxford's Pandemic Sciences Institute and the Faculty of History will share their research and experiences with the IR graduate students of Ritsumeikan University.
