④ Japanese Placement Test (ROJPT): July 26 to July 31, 2025

Students who have learned Japanese (either as their native language or a foreign language) must take the Japanese placement test, which will be open from July 26 to July 31, 2025. Please check the email titled "IMPORTANT: Japanese Language Proficiency Questionnaire (CRPS)" that was sent on July 11 for the login information.

1) Students with NO Experience of Studying Japanese

Students who have never studied Japanese do not need to take the Japanese placement test.

2) Students who have learned Japanese (either as their native language or a foreign language)

These students need to take the Japanese placement test to be placed to the Japanese courses of an appropriate level.

Also, a short interview with Japanese language instructor(s) is planned on **September 1 or 2.**

⑤ English Writing Placement Test: September 16 to 17, 2025

All students, including native English speakers, must take the online English placement test for the academic writing course, which will be open **from September 16 to 17, 2025. The detail will be announced by the Administrative Office of College of Policy Science by email.**

(*1) *Students who are approved to be native English speakers or have an equivalent proficiency according to their application documents are required to take a minimum of 6 credits from English for Academic Purposes courses.

(*2) *Students who are placed to "Proficient" level after the Japanese language placement tests (online test & interview) upon enrollment are required to take a minimum of 6 credits from Foreign Language courses.

(*3) *Students can register up to 20 credits.

(2) "Foreign Languages" courses

① Japanese Courses ("Elementary", "Intermediate" and "Advanced" levels)

Basically, students will be placed in appropriate courses based on the submitted "Japanese Language Proficiency Questionnaire" and the Japanese placement test scheduled for from July 26 to July 31.

1) Students without any experience of studying Japanese

Students who have never studied Japanese do not need to take the placement test. They will be automatically placed in Elementary Japanese 1 class.

2) Students who have learned Japanese (either as their native language or a foreign language)

These students must take the Japanese placement test, which is open from July 26 to July 31. Japanese Language class will be determined by the result of Japanese placement test. Also, a short interview with Japanese language instructor(s) is planned on September 1 or 2.

② Other Language courses (*for students with certain Japanese proficiency)

1) Chinese, Korean, Vietnamese, Thai, Indonesian, French, German, Spanish, Russian, Italian

If the College approves that you are proficient in Japanese to some extent, you can register for “**Introduction to Languages for Global Actions**” which is a Japanese-medium course held in Fall semesters. This is the introduction course that prepares you to choose and learn one of the following 10 languages; German, French, Spanish, Italian, Russian, Korean, Thai, Indonesian, and Vietnamese, from spring semesters and thereafter.

Note that you cannot choose to study a language of which you are a native speaker.

2) Japanese (“Proficient” level)

Highly-Proficient level Japanese classes are open to students with a Japanese ability equivalent to or higher than JLPT N1 (approximately 900 study hours of Japanese) and wish to further improve their Japanese ability. In these classes, students will mainly develop their composition [文章表現], comprehension [読解], and listening and oral comprehension [聴解口頭].

Purpose of studying Japanese language

Although the Community and Regional Policy Studies Major is an English-based major, in order to ensure that students studying in Japan experience a well-rounded student life and education and have a variety of career options, we recommend that students take Japanese courses proactively with the following goals in mind.

- 1) Acquire basic skills that allow one to engage in daily conversation.
- 2) Keep improving the skills into the future.

Although the minimum required number of credits for the Foreign Language courses is decided, students who wish to improve their Japanese language can continue taking Japanese classes beyond the minimum requirements until graduation. In the future, if a student chooses an occupation in Japan or one with a strong connection to Japan, a high level of Japanese ability will be desired. We urge you to take advantage of the Japanese curriculum at Ritsumeikan University.
